

CDR. Albert Van Acker Commanding Officer

CDR. Albert Van Acker, USN, the Commanding Officer, USS LLOYD THOMAS (DD-764), hails

from Winetha, Illinois and Clinton, Connecticut.

He graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy in the class of 1944. After two months air indoctrination, he attended submarine school at New London, Connecticut. On graduation from submarine school, CDR. Van Acker was assigned to a submarine relief crew based in Freemantle, Australia. From April 1944 to January 1945 he made five successful war patrols in USS NARWHAL (ss-167). This was followed by further war patrol action in USS BERGALL (ss-320). For his service during this period CDR. Van Acker holds the following medals. American Defense Service Medal, North American Theater Medal; Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal, World War II Victory Medal; Philippine Liberation Medal with Star and the Philippine Presidential Unit Citation.

From July 1945, when he was designated "qualified in submarines" to June 1949, CDR. Van Acker served in USS FINBACK (ss-230) based in Pearl Harbor, and later, in New London. Following this tour, he earned a Master of Science Degree in Electrical Engineering at the U.S. Naval

Postgraduate School.

After two years on the staff of Commander, Submarine Forces, U.S. Atlantic Fleet, CDR. Van Acker was ordered to sea as Operations Officer and then Executive Officer of USS SIGOURNEY (DD-643) when the ship won the Battle "E" award. A tour at the Bureau of Ships, Washington, D.C. was followed by duty in USS WYANDOT (AKA-92) as Executive Officer during an Antarctic Replenishment Cruise.

From June 1959 to June 1961 he was an instructor of Electrical Engineering at the U.S. Naval Academy. In July 1961 CDR. Van Acker assumed command of USS JOHN HOOD (DD-655). He re-

lieved as Commanding Officer, USS LLOYD THOMAS in December 1961.

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
And of course December 25th brought the Christmas Holidays-celebrated in true American style though some felt there were better places it could have been spent.


Indian Ocean Transit
